If two heads are better than one, imagine what you could do with three or four. The task that fell to Warrior of the Week Airman 1st Class Marcos Morales wasn't deciding what to do with them. It was figuring out where to get them.

"There was some research going on at the hospital at Keesler AFB, my first duty station after contracting tech school, and I was tasked to buy some human heads," Morales said.

With a bit of research of his own, he discovered that while it is illegal to buy or sell human body parts, they can be leased. He arranged with the University of Southern Alabama to lease the heads of a few cadavers that had been willed to science.

That sort of mission focus and do-what-it-takes attitude are characteristics the Airman brought with him to the Air Force and which the Air Force has helped him put to use.

"I definitely want to stay in the Air Force. It's a good, structured environment. I might like to explore some other career fields ... perhaps medical."

And he may be ready to tackle a new career field soon at the rate he's going.

"He is picking up the complicated contracting career field quickly," said Lt. Col. Rodger Phillips, commander of the 15th Contracting Squadron. "He's an excellent athlete and just a great all-around Airman."





Team Hickam History

The Air Force's most historic airfield

November 16, 1957 — The 65th Troop Carrier Squadron (later the 65th Airlift Squadron), in Reserve status, is transferred without personnel and equipment from Paine AFB, Washington, to Davis Field, Oklahoma.

November 16, 1961 — Evacuation exercise involves approximately 500 dependents of military personnel living at Hickam FB who are evacuated to Wheeler. Highway traffic was controlled jointly by the Hawaiian Armed Services Police and the Honolulu Police Department.

November 19, 1976 — The 15th Air Base Wing receives an Air Force Outstanding Unit Award for exceptionally meritorious service from April 4 to Sept. 3, 1975. (This was the Wing's third AFOUA).

November 20, 1976 — The new Hickam Chapel is dedicated in Area 61, on Kuntz Avenue

across from the new dormitories. General Henry J. Meade, Chief of USAF Chaplains, delivered the dedicatory address.



November 16, 1983 — A severe earthquake on the Big Island causes considerable damage at Kilauea Military Camp, a recreational area for all the military services.

November 14, 1990 — Forty-four members of the 15th Security Police Squadron deploy to the Middle East in support of Operation DESERT SHIELD. Led by 1Lt. Michael P. Buonaugurio, the contingent of 42 men and 2 women deployed to Dhahran, Saudi Arabia.

November 20, 2004 — At Hickam Harbor, Col. Raymond Torres, 15th Airlift Wing commander, plays host to the second annual Makahiki event, a traditional Hawaiian "Thanksgiving"-type celebration.

Hickam Health Tip

The common cold is brought to you by any one of 200 viruses.

The symptoms of a cold include runny nose, red eyes, sneezing, sore throat, dry cough, headache, and general body aches. There is a gradual one- or two-day onset. As colds progress, the nasal mucus may thicken.

This is the stage just before the cold completes its course. A cold usually lasts 1-2 weeks. Home treatment will relieve symp-

toms and include: get extra rest, drink plenty of liquids, take ibuprofen or acetaminophen to relieve aches, humidify your bedroom and take hot showers to relieve nasal stuffiness, and gargle with warm water if throat is sore. Prevention measures should include getting plenty of rest, exercise, avoiding people who have colds, and frequent hand washing. Please refer to your Healthwise Handbook for when to call a health professional.



FITNESSTIPS

EXERCISE: Medicine Ball Pullover with Stability Ball

MUSCLE: Lats, Hips and Glutes

- Start by sitting on stability ball holding medicine ball in front of you
- Slowly roll down stability ball while placing head and neck on ball with both feet pointed straight ahead. Keep hips, knees and toes in alignment
- Raise hips towards ceiling forming a straight plank parallel to the floor
- Position medicine ball straight up towards ceiling
- Slowly lower ball away from hips until parallel to the floor
- Slowly return the ball to the starting position
- Complete steps until you've reached the desired number of reps.
